
My gypsy blood runs deep and I am well in touch with the souls of those Rucker ancestors of mine that roamed the West.

I am a second generation Californian, my mother AND father both being born in CA. I was raised on stories of travel, my mother's father being in the business of oil production, she lived in exotic locales such as on the Amazon River in Brazil visiting Machu Pichu and Egypt during her high school years. I yearned to travel and see these places for myself. After completing my AA degree in a community college, I had saved enough money as a waitress to go to France for a year of school. I didn't know a soul, didn't go with anyone, and didn't speak the language. The first 3 months were tough as the family I lived with didn't speak English, so communication was difficult. But by Christmas time, I was able to speak French and by the time I left I was dreaming in French and had traveled to twelve European countries from Greece to Denmark and really didn't want to come home. It was after my return

that I met and fell in love with my husband of 17 years, Keith Meyer.

We struggled putting him through School for Chiropractic and our first home was a mobile home. Moving into our second house after a year, we dreamed of a big Victorian house on a couple of acres, raising horses and dogs within a couple miles of Keith's Chiropractic Practice. That dream took about 10 years to realize.

We spent 7 great years in a huge house, throwing BIG parties, enjoying trail riding out our backyard on horseback on 1500 acres of wilderness in Southern California. Luckily we both came to the realization at the same time, that the material objects were demanding all of our free time.

Between the practice, caring for up to 8 horses, 3 dogs, and 3 acres, we were not able to get away and travel as we wanted. And we had decided we wanted to relocate to a place that had more trees than people. That is definitely NOT Southern California. So an idea to simply sell the house and business and relocate, became a plan to travel the USA in a motor home and look for property before settling. But we knew when we found that perfect 30 acres we were looking for, we would have a mortgage and not be able to travel as much again. So Keith suggested going to Europe first, before traveling the North American Continent and I suggested Round the World airline tickets good for a year! We have not regretted one minute of selling everything we owned in California--house, business, horses, etc.--and going on the adventure of a lifetime!

As for my gypsy blood, it has well taken over. It has been two years since we decided this was something we wanted to do. The first year we spent circling the globe, 34 countries in a year, traveling by airplane, boat, camper-van, and much of it on foot! We rented a 500 year old villa in Tuscany and stayed a month. We shipped a camper-van from California to Greece and put

over 22,000 miles on it all over Europe. Through genealogy, we met many new family members and saw my 500 year old ancestral home in Schleswig, Germany. We had some dangerous times also, such as a 9 p.m. curfew with machine guns in Kenya and missing the bomb in Omagh, Ireland by 2 weeks! Some of our favorite places included New Zealand, South Africa, Egypt, Jordan, Turkey and just about all of Europe. Our least favorite were Kenya and Israel and there is a long list of reasons but the main one was "the people."

We are now well into part B of "Keith and Cindi's Excellent Adventure" and we are not going to quit any time soon, God Willing. We spent the summer of 1999 in the Maritimes--New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island--and Quebec. While there we helped out with a Habitat for Humanity Build providing 10 houses in 5 days. What a great feeling giving 40 children homes that didn't have one previously.

Keith has taken woodcarving classes and I have my laptop and my genealogy database. He carves while I research.

We have met incredible people, and surprisingly, many, like us under 50 years old, are doing the same thing we are. We feel so fortunate to be taking our retirement in the middle of our lives.



My parents are Donald D. Bonney and Loralein "Lee" Crooke. My mother, Lee is the daughter of Harry Crooke and Lily<sup>8</sup> Wanda Seaman (Sarah<sup>7</sup> Rose Rucker, Richard<sup>6</sup> M., Julius<sup>5</sup>, Abner<sup>4</sup>, Anthony<sup>3</sup>, John<sup>2</sup>, Peter<sup>1</sup>).

My great grandmother, Rose Rucker, was born July 17, 1877 in Coleman Co, Texas, one of 11 children born to Richard Morton and Emily Jane Cox Rucker. Her brothers were "real cowboys" of the "real wild west" and there are many stories in our family of "bronc bustin, cattle drives, and roamin" the states of TX, CA, NM, CO, and AZ searching for better pasture lands.

In fact one family legend has Emily Jane Cox Rucker and her daughters out on the prairie in a sod house and meeting Geronimo and his Indian party. The story that has been handed down says that she was left at the house with her daughters as the men went out hunting. Geronimo and about five Indian scouts approached on ponies wanting food for the men and water for the horses. Emily and the girls had poisoned the flour in case things went bad. However, they eventually made biscuits for Geronimo and his men using the untainted flour, 'cuz she seemed to think he was very nice and polite. But, according to legend, she thought he had a high, squeaky voice. I don't know if it's true, but I do know this family was in the same area as Geronimo and his band.



Also Elizabeth Rucker married 19 Jun 1837, William Penninger, born 1 Apr 1815, bondsman, Henry Penninger.

THADDEUS RUCKER was married to Amanda Susan McMillan 6/20/1862 in Fillmore County, MN. I do not know where Thaddeus was born nor his dob. Amanda was born on 12/28/1843 but I do not know where. Their son, Milton Haswell Rucker, was born on 1/18/1870 in Jackson, MN. or Jackson County, MN (I am not sure which). Milton married Anna Stevens on 8/24/1895 at Prairie Du Chien, WI. Their son, Lloyd Thaddeus Rucker, was born on 1/26/1897 in Osage, IA. and Lloyd's son, Leland Eugene Rucker was born on 7/21/1918 in Osage, IA. He is my father.

I can not get any farther back than Thaddeus Rucker. If anyone knows anything about this line of Rucker's in Northeastern Iowa and Southeastern Minnesota, I would certainly appreciate any information that you might have and would want to share.

### JOSHUA CARTER RUCKER

Jim Garner has placed a marker to his ancestor, Joshua Rucker, a fourth generation Rucker, son of Joshua, William, Peter (Wood, p.240-241). He "was the last born child of Joshua Rucker of Amelia Co., VA. married first in Cumberland Co., then VA moved to Eastern Kentucky. After having several children, they migrated Springfield, IL. His wife died en and he remarried Springfield. He and his second family then moved to Ogle Co., IL where his second wife died and then he moved the family to Southern Iowa.

"Joshua Carter Rucker died in Iowa in 1878 and was buried in Orleans Cemetery with a marker of softstone. It has done well, con-

sidering it's 120 years old, but it was broken and unreadable. I assumed the task of remarking the grave. All plans for the new horizontal bronze marker were approved by the Orleans trustees and the erection of the marker has been completed as shown in the enclosed photo. It was decided to retain the old marker by adding it to the new marker. All information is the same, except we added his place of birth.

"Funds were solicited from those whom I had previous correspondence, resulted in \$175.00 (\$50 Kansas, \$115 Iowa, \$10 Washington). Total cost of the marker was \$500.00 (\$200 bronze and \$300 mounting).

"This letter is forwarded for two reasons. One is to add to the wide list of markers and signs which the Rucker Society has and is continuing to add to our genealogical efforts. The other is to ask for assistance from the membership if they would be so kind as to make a contribution.

"I am a member of the Rucker Family Society and have attended the last four reunions. On my first attendance, at Fredericksburg in 1992, I became the first descendant of William to attend."

JULIUS RUCKER, b. ca 1805 in Woodford Co., KY, Cindi Meyer's ancestor (see p.21) left home and was not heard from again. He was not listed in Wood's book. Julius's estate in Kentucky was divided in 1864 among his nieces and nephews and he was considered dead. Census records show him to be in Illinois in 1840, Missouri in 1850 and California in 1860. He was listed in Coleman, Texas, in the 1880 census.


### CORRECTIONS

## WILLIAM AND MARY RUCKER

Of Shenandoah County, Virginia

William Rucker, b. ca 1809, d. 1892 (cemetery records); m. Mary A. \_\_\_\_, b. ca 1819, d. 1898 (cemetery records). They were listed in Shenandoah Co., VA, in the census records. William's occupation in the 1870 census, was listed as "cooper." William and Mary were buried at Bethel Lutheran Church Cemetery. The census records give the names of their children.

1850 Shenandoah Co., VA, census, 58th Dist, p.10:
William Rucker, age 36; Mary 28;
Mary F. 10; Samuel 8; Elizabeth
4; Amanda 2; John T. 4/12.

1860 Shenandoah Co., VA, census, Lantz Mill Dist, p.765: William Rucker, age 51, cooper, /\$40; Mary 39; Samuel 18; Barbara 15; Elizabeth 14; Amanda 13, in school; Rebecca 9; Virginia 5; Thomas 3; Susan 1.

1870 Shenandoah Co., VA, census, Madison twp, p.765: William Rucker, age 59, cooper, /\$100; Mary A. 50, housekeeper; Amanda 27; Virginia 15; Thomas 13; Susan [Victoria] 10; Victoria S. 5; Charles 6/12, b. Dec [were the last two grand-children?].

While visiting the area in September 1999, I could not find any deeds or estate records for William and Mary Rucker. They must have rented their home, so there is no clue as to where they came from or even if William was descended from Peter Rucker.

At the cemetery, I could not find their tombstones. There were some old stones that were worn beyond readability. Some were even written in German.

Samuel Rucker was the only son for whom there is marriage and cemetery records. Did the others die young or move west?

Samuel B. Rucker, b. 27 Mar 1842, d. 15 Dec 1902; m. 18 Jan 1866, Shenandoah Co., VA, to Mary A. Walker, b. 22 Aug 1830, d. 22 Jan 1903. In their marriage records it said Mary was a widow. They had four daughters, two of whom were unmarried and living in the 1920 Shenandoah Co. Census.
