

# THE RHUKER MANSION

Home of Joseph H. Rucker (1865-1931) 418 South 3<sup>rd</sup> Street San Jose, California by Chuck Berry of Scotts Valley, CA

The lovely Victorian home pictured here is now called the "Rucker Mansion." It was the home of Joseph H. Rucker, who being in the real estate business desired a charming home. The Rucker Mansion, built circa 1892, is located in San Jose in Santa Clara County, California. The large three story residence was built in the Queen Anne-Eastlake style.

## FAMILY INFOR-MATION

Joseph<sup>7</sup> H.<sup>1</sup> Rucker (Joseph<sup>6</sup> E., William<sup>5</sup> T., William<sup>4</sup>, John<sup>3</sup>, Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Peter<sup>1</sup>) was born March 25, 1865, in San Jose, CA. He attended the University

of the Pacific, finishing his education at the Garden City Business College He married in June of 1888, to Mary Phileta Dunne. They lived in San Jose, CA where Joseph was the president of the Joseph H. Rucker Co., Inc., a real estate, loan and insurance company.

His father, Joseph Edmundson Rucker founded the company in 1874 and nine years later took his oldest son into partnership. Later his other sons came into the business. Joseph E. Rucker was born in Howard County, Missouri and traveled with his parents, siblings and other family members to Santa Clara, California in 1852. See more about this family and their trek west in RFSN, Dec 1999, Vol. 10, No. 4, p.31-33. Joseph E. Rucker married September 27, 1855, in Gilroy, California to Miss Susan Brown, who had come to California the previous year. He farmed for a few years before entering the real estate business.

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Joseph H. Rucker's wife Mary Dunne's mother, Catherine (O"Toole) Dunne, owned one of the last great Spanish land grants about three miles north of Gilroy. It was placed on the market in 1893 with lots of 6, 10, 20, and 40 acres selling for \$25 to \$125 per acre to primarily agricultural families. From this real estate venture came the town of "Rucker." The town was composed of about 100 farms with acreage ranging from 5 to 75 acres in size, the Rowley Thomas Mercantile Store with the U. S. Post Office, a blacksmith shop and the Santa Cruz Fruit Company. A school district was formed in 1894 to educate children living in the Rucker town area. The first nine students were housed in a shed until the new \$5,000, two story school could be completed in the fall of 1894. Although the town of Rucker is not incorporated today, Rucker school still exists, although not the original building.

When Joseph H. Rucker joined his father's real estate business, the name was changed to J. E. Rucker & Son. After J. E. Rucker's death, the name was changed to J. H. Rucker & Company. He continued in the real estate business and with the firm later being joined by his son DeWitt C. Rucker and grandson DeWitt L. Rucker. Their business mainly consisted of the sale and purchase of real estate, renting houses, collecting rents and handling subdivisions of large tracts of land. A large part of their business was investments, lending money and handling insurance. It was

described as one of the most reliable and substantial firms engaged in the real estate business in San Jose.

# THE RUCKER MANSION

The outside of the house is very Victorian looking with a round turret at one corner and gabled roof on the front. A wraparound porch

extends the entire front and side of the house. It has many elegant touches of the period including gingerbread trim. The Carriage House in the rear was converted in 1969 from a dirt floor stable with servants' quarters upstairs into a lovely apartment with an open beamed ceiling.

A previous owner said the house was built as a wedding gift by a neighbor for his daughter. The daughter was killed in an accident in Europe on her honeymoon, so the house was sold. It was probably at this time that the home was purchased by Joseph H. Rucker.

We do know, according to "Sunshine Fruit and Flowers," published in 1895<sup>2</sup>, the Ruckers were living in the home by that year. The house was sold sometime in the 1920s when it was converted into eight apartments.

The interior of the house opens up into a large entrance hall and foyer that includes a carved wooden staircase and walls with intricately inlaid paneling. The original copper gas light fixture with cranberry glass is still hanging in the front hall. The house retains much of its original decor such as stained glass windows (including the front door), and a handsomely carved fireplace with bronze trim and small ceramic tiles, marble sinks, and brass hardware, as well as carved wood molding.

Joseph H. and Mary Rucker had three children: Joseph E. Rucker, b. 1889; DeWitt C Rucker, b. 1892; and Jerome W. Rucker, b. in 1894. Joseph H. Rucker died July 5, 1931 and his wife Mary died January 1, 1953.

The photo of the house was taken by Jean Ellen Vallandigham, sister of Chuck Berry who has submitted this article. The mansion is on the National Historic Register and the exterior is maintained as originally built. The sign in front of the house says "Rucker Mansion." It is currently owned by Mrs. Ardith Meyer and the address is 418 S. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street in San Jose, California.

Shortly after sending out the last newsletter, I heard from Mary Lou Reifel of Baton Rouge, LA inquiring about her Rucker ancestors. I should mention that she had not seen the newsletter and had no idea who her Rucker ancestors were. The only information she gave was her ancestor's name was Mattie Rucker and she was born 3 May 1865 in Unionville, Bedford Co., TN and her parents were born in Virginia.

I looked in the Tennessee Research Book (by Ron Payne) and found a Mattie Rucker of the right age in the 1880 Dyer Co., TN Census, Dist. 13, p.10B: B. F. Rucker, age 21, b. TN; A. V., age 54, b. VA, mother of B.F.; Lula 18, b. TN, sister of B.F.; Josie 16, b. TN, sister of B.F.; Mattie 15, b. TN, sister of B.F.; Chas. McDearmon, age 6, b. TN, nephew of B. F.; Clem McDearmon, age 5, b.

TN, nephew of B.F.

Here was a Mattie age 15, listed with her siblings and mother. But I didn't think it was the right one as she lived in Dyer Co. not Bedford. A good clue was the nephews, Chas and Clem McDearmon, because their brother, Neil B. Rucker had married 13 Mar 1873 to A. F. McDearmon. The 1850 and 1860 censuses, listed in the last newsletter showed, S. H. (or Sol) as the son of Benjamin<sup>4</sup> Rucker (Ambrose<sup>3</sup>, John<sup>2</sup>, Peter<sup>1</sup>) from Virginia.

Was this the right Mattie? I wrote Mary Lou Reifel and much to my delight she said, YES, it was the correct Mattie. Mattie Rucker, b. 3 May 1865, Unionville, Bedford Co., TN; m. 9 Feb

1882, Dyer Co., TN to Henry Edgar Rogers, b. 18 Jun 1858, Dyer Co., TN, d. 12 Jun 1915, Gates, TN. (Mattie died young after bearing 7 children and Edgar remarried.)

Mary Lou Reifel wrote: "I am having published on Sept. 1 a book about my Reifel family, called 'A Legacy of Love.' My second book I have under contract is about the Rogers/Rucker families and will be called 'Searching for the Women."

# IN MEMORIAM

Mary Elizabeth Rucker Snyder, age 77 died March 14, 2002 in New Albany, Indiana. She was the daughter of Allen McCreary Rucker and Anna Thomas Hays. Her line of descent is as follows: Mary<sup>9</sup> E. Rucker, Allen<sup>8</sup> M., Thomas<sup>7</sup> A., Lunsford<sup>6</sup> T., George<sup>5</sup>, James<sup>4</sup>, John<sup>3</sup>, John<sup>2</sup>, Peter<sup>1</sup>.

Mary was born in Shelbyville, Kentucky, having lived in Scott County, Indiana as a child. She studied at The Art Center of Louisville and Spencerian Business College early in her life. Later, she attended the University of Louisville and Indiana University Southeast.

Mary retired from the Census Bureau in Jeffersonville, IN in 1986 and participated in the 1990 national Census Bureau population count.

Mary was active in genealogy for many years. She was the editor of "Rucker Ruckus," a newsletter highlighting the Rucker family history. Also, she was also a board member of the Rucker Family Society and enjoyed attending many of their reunions. She belonged to many genealogy and historical societies. Her hobbies included arts and crafts, gardening and camping.

She is survived by three daughters, Grace A. Rouck of Clarksville, IN, Deborah L. Stemmle of Crestwood, KY, and Edwina A. Snyder of Jeffersonville, IN; two sons, Edward P. Snyder Jr. and Allen W. Snyder, both of Jeffersonville; and three grandchildren.

Mary was preceded in death by her husband of 38 years, Edward P. Snyder Sr. and a grandchild, Max A. Wiley of Indianapolis.

Note: Mary was deaf, having lost her hearing after the birth of her oldest child, Grace. This hindered her only slightly as she could lip-read.

Samuel James ("Jim") Rucker IV, 75, of Cheyenne, Wyoming died Feb. 20, 2002. He was born Oct. 1, 1926, in Englewood, Colorado, the son of Samuel and Leademna Rucker. He had lived in Cheyenne for the past 32 years. He graduated from Englewood High School and joined the U.S. Army Air Force during World War II. He also served with the U.S. Air Force Reserve during the Korean Conflict. Mr. Rucker retired as a hydrologist for the U.S. Geological Survey after 40 years of service.

Jim is survived by his wife, Vivian Rucker, whom he married Dec. 14, 1947; his daughter, Patricia Lee Anderson of Cheyenne; sons, Samuel James Rucker V of Vacaville, Calif., and Jeffrey Arthur Rucker of Peyton, Colo.; and six grandchildren. He was preceded in death by a brother, Gale F. Rucker; and a sister, Frances E. Ferrell. He was buried at Cheyenne Memorial Gardens. His obit was printed in the Wyoming *Tribune-Eagle*, Feb. 24, 2002 (from the Internet).

Frank Allen Beesley, age 68 died August 25, 2001 at his home in Scipio, Indiana. He was born Sept. 12, 1932 in Jennings County, the son of Minor Beesley and Virgie Hartwell.

He retired in 1990 after 23 years with Arvin/Pilot Industries in North Vernon. Before that he worked for 17½ years at Golden Foundry in Columbus. His hobbies included farming, hunting, traveling, camping and attending bluegrass festivals. He enjoyed collecting Edison records. Frank was a member of the Independent Order of Foresters and the Hoosier Hills Bluegrass Association and the Scipio United Methodist Church.

Frank married Margaret Rucker (Millard<sup>8</sup> E., Edward<sup>7</sup> W., Nathan<sup>6</sup> C. Jr., Nathan<sup>5</sup> Chaney, Reuben<sup>4</sup>, Wyatt<sup>3</sup>, James<sup>2</sup>, Peter<sup>1</sup>—lineage between Reuben and Wyatt not proved) on Dec. 30, 1950 in Vernon. He is survived by his wife; two sons, Robert Minor Beesley of Chicago and Bernard Wayne Beesley of Butlerville; four daughters, Patricia Ann Brennan of North Vernon, Kristia Annette Claghorn of Butlerville, Penny Jo Royse of Brewersville, and Donna Kay Gassaway of Taylorsville, KY. He is survived by a brother, six sisters, fifteen grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. He was preceded in death by a brother, a sister, a grandchild, Curtis Minor Beesley, and a great-grandchild, Malachi Joseph Longbrake.

### PRE-REUNION TRIP THURSDAY, OCTOBER 17

On Thursday, October 17 we will tour the middle part of the state of Missouri. This trip will be held separately from the reunion and is being planned by Chuck Berry and Karl Rice. You have the choice of staying in Kansas City/Independence and car pooling to the area or staying overnight in a motel in Arrow Rock or Moberly.

We will visit the counties of Saline, Chariton, Howard, Randolph and possibly Boone, visiting the towns and cemeteries of our Rucker forebears. Missouri is a state where many of the descendants of Peter Rucker migrated.

\*We will visit the church of Rev. Thornton Rucker (William<sup>4</sup>, John<sup>3</sup>, Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Peter<sup>1</sup>, Wood, p.182), a Baptist minister. He established Heath Creek Church and Cemetery near Arrow Rock where he, his father William, and other relatives are buried. The town of "Rucker" in MO was named for him.

\*Thornton's brother was William T. Rucker, Chuck Berry's great-grandfather. He lived in Howard County, MO, until 1852 when the Ruckers and Campbells left for California via a wagon train. It left from Asa Finley's property at the fork of the Salt Fork and Blackwater Rivers near Arrow Rock in Saline Co., MO.

\*Remember RFS member, Ambrose S. Rucker Jr.

(Ambrose<sup>6</sup> S., Joseph<sup>5</sup> E., Ephraim<sup>4</sup>, Tomagen<sup>3</sup>, Ephraim<sup>2</sup>, Peter<sup>1</sup>) and (Augustine<sup>3</sup>, James<sup>2</sup>, Peter<sup>1</sup>) from our early reunions in Virginia. Ambrose was born in Salisbury, Chariton Co., MO, reared in Moberly and lived his adult years in Kansas City. (See obit, RFSN, Vol. 4, No. 3, p.28, Sep 1993.)

\*John D. L. Rucker (John<sup>4</sup>, Isaac<sup>3</sup>, John<sup>2</sup>, Peter<sup>1</sup>, Wood, p.137) and his son Maj. John Fleming Rucker lived and are buried in Sturgeon in Boone Co., MO. He married his cousin, Julia Rucker (William<sup>4</sup>, John<sup>3</sup>, Ephraim<sup>2</sup>, Peter<sup>1</sup>, Wood, p.289). Their son Booker Hall Rucker was well known in the town of Moberly.

\*Buried in Arrow Rock Cemetery is George A. Rucker (Angus³, Ephraim², Peter¹, Wood, p.283) and his son, Angus A. Rucker. This family has only recently been made known to us.

We will have lunch in the town of Arrow Rock, a quaint village on the Sante Fe Trail with many gift and antique shops. It has a few restored buildings, e.g., an old tavern, log courthouse and stone jail.

Maybe we can return to Kansas City from Arrow Rock by the old Santa Fe, Oregon and California wagon train trail (highways 41 to 65 to 24).

If you want to join us on this tour, please let us know. If there is enough interest, we will charter a bus from Kansas City. It's about a two-hour trip to Arrow Rock. Details will be forth coming later.
