
1992 Rucker Reunion

Saturday morning began bright and sunny with most people riding the bus to Vauter's church in Essex County. Descendants were visiting the early stomping grounds of their ancestor, Peter Rucker, and his children. The Ruckers attended Vauter's church. а colonial church, of brick laid in Flemish bond, built originally in 1719, enlarged in 1731. The Ruckers had migrated from Essex by 1731, but I feel that Vauter's was the church they had attended while living there.

After coffee and homemade muffins and goodies, the clan convened in the church itself. Rod Mason, our president presided. He introduced the minister, Philip Haug, who in turn introduced the church historian who gave us the history of the Vauter's. We then had our meeting (see minutes for official business).

After scrumptious buffet а lunch, the group began a delightful tour of Peter Rucker's Essex County. Roland Pittman made many trips to Essex to locate the Rucker's land. While no house site remains, we visited certain sites mentioned in deeds of the Ruckers. The location of Peter Rucker's 500 acres was near Larsen's Mill on Occupatia Creek. Roland thinks this was "Hunter's Mill" and we traipsed through briars, brambles, and poison ivy to see the abandoned mill. (If only the ladies had known, we would have worn hiking shoes.)

Our next stop was the "Glebe," home of the parson of Vauter's Church. It is a handsome house, also built in the Flemish bond style, probably by the same builders of the church. The home is deteriorating and all that remains is the shell of the house. To see that beautiful house fall into disrepair was distressing to all of us.

Our last stop was the site of Peter Rucker's 56 acres given to his sons by Frederick Coghill. After hiking a quarter mile, we stretched our imagination to see the bog which contained a tree that was a corner of the property.

The weather was warm and beautiful and everyone commended Roland for the wonderful afternoon visiting the original land of the Ruckers.


Saturday evening was spent relaxing and visiting at Roland's and Joyce's hospitality room. Then everyone collapsed from aching feet.

Reprints of Sudie Rucker Wood's THE RUCKER FAMILY GENEALOGY

Our Rucker Family Society has 220 copies of Sudie Rucker Wood's <u>The</u> <u>Rucker Family Genealogy</u> reprinted in 1991. They were mostly sold before printing and the few extra copies printed were sold out quickly. A number of people have indicated an interest in another reprinting so it was decided at the reunion in Fredericksburg to look into doing so. We can have another reprinting done at \$16 per copy, including taxes, packing and postage, if we can get a minimum of 100 copies ordered and prepaid. These reprints, identical to the 1991 reprints, will have plastic laminated soft covers. These books will be printed from photocopies of Sudie Rucker Wood's 1932 book, and will NOT contain any new or updated information.

These books would be great gifts for your Rucker kin and friends. If enough orders are not received to have this printing made, all monies will be refunded. Neither the printer nor the postal service has announced their next price increase, but increases can occur, so we should proceed promptly if there is enough interest to support this reprinting. The 1992 reunion meeting of the Rucker Family Society was held at Vauter's Church, Essex County, Virginia on Saturday, October 10, 1992. Rod Mason presided and Charles Robinson served as Secretary.

The meeting opened with a welcome from Rev. Philip Haug, the priest of the parish, and a short talk on the history of the church by the church historian.

Charles Robinson summarized the actions by the Board at their meeting the previous day. He described the proposed dues increase and the Board's desire for suggestions from the members for future reunions.

The election of Directors and Officers: All present Directors were reelected except Anna Watson and Jeanne Fallon. Carolyn Billups and James M. Rucker were elected Directors to fill these vacancies and were introduced to the membership.

In recognition of her services to the Society and her present inability to remain on the Board, Anna Watson was elected Director Emeritus of the Society.

Jack White, Treasurer, made his report, following which the members considered the dues increase. An increase in annual dues from \$5 to \$7, effective January 1, 1993 for the next two years, was approved.

Roland Pittman, Vice President, asked all Ruckers by blood line to stand, and 65 such persons were present. He then asked for how many states were represented, and members were present from eighteen states as follows:

Roland then described the places to be visited on the tour following the meeting and lunch.

Carolyn Billups, registrar for the reunion, reported 108 people had signed up for Saturday's lunch.

Rod Mason reported the deaths of several members since the last reunion, as noted in the newsletters.

Jean Robinson spoke on Peter Rucker's arrival in 1700 instead of 1690 as previously thought. She also described early life in Virginia, to help the members appreciate how Peter Rucker and his family had lived.

The meeting recessed for buffet lunch and a tour of sites in the area, either associated with Peter Rucker or of the time period he lived there, including 56 acres of land given to Peter Rucker's sons by the Coghill family.

The meeting reconvened on Sunday, October 11, 1992, at the Sheraton Hotel in Fredericksburg, Rod Mason, presiding.

Jack White reported briefly on the 1994 reunion in Bedford County, Virginia. His committee includes James M. Rucker, Ruth McBride, William Rucker and Mary Johnson. The dates will be June 17-19, 1994.

Gerald Rucker reported on his use of the LDS software package for geneology which he found superior to others. He suggested the members of the Rucker Society adopt its use to be able to communicate with each other via computer.

Jean Robinson talked about John Rucker's ownership of Lot #5, prime waterfront property, in Fredericksburg and its connection to his "serving of the punch" at a political election which caused him to be accused of "great misdemeaners."

Roland Pittman expressed the hope that participation would increase at future reunions, and encouraged members to "Reach out for Ruckers" and pass the word about the next reuninon.

Carolyn Billups gave a most interesting slide presentation of the DAR headquarters in Washington which featured the various rooms decorated and furnished by different states.

After a vote of thanks to Roland and Joyce Pittman for the outstanding tour they had arranged the previous day, and for hosting a most successful reunion, Gerald Rucker read a prayer composed by Ambrose Rucker. Carolyn Billups concluded the meeting by singing The Star Spangled Banner.

THREE CHILDREN OF JAMES MADISON RUCKER DIED WITHIN A MONTH:

Warner Rucker, featured in the Family Profile in the Vol. 3, No. 1, Feb 1992 issue of this newsletter, has died. His brother Lewis died within four days and their sister "Girlie" died a month earlier. The only surviving sibling, of the original 13 children of James Madison Rucker and Janie Ellis Duff (Wood, p.112), is Minnie Rucker Bazler who celebrated her 100th birthday on 8 Nov 1992, see Vol 3, No. 3, p.5, Aug 1992, <u>Rucker Family Society Newsletter</u>. None of the three had children.

VIVIAN MAE ("GIRLIE") RUCKER SHUMAN, died at the age of 87, 10 Aug 1992, in Hill Top, WV. Her husband was Edward P. Shuman. She was buried at Fort Hill Memorial Park in Lynchburg. (Source: the Lynchburg Newspaper, 12 Aug 1992, sent in by her nephew, Frank Bazler.)

LEWIS POINDEXTER RUCKER, age 93, died at Lynchburg Nursing Home, 17 Sep 1992. He was the husband of the late Lula Shirley Rucker. Lewis was a retired mechanical contractor and a member of Monroe United Methodist Church. He was buried at Fort Hill Memorial Park in Lynchburg. WARNER ARNOLD RUCKER, age 90, died 21 Sep 1992, at Lynchburg General Hospital. He is survived by his wife, Mary Crist Rucker. He was a member of the New Prospect Baptist Church, in Amherst County. He was buried in the Allwood Cemetery in Amherst Co., VA. (Source: the Amherst New Era-Progress, 24 Sep 1992, submitted by Rod Mason.)

MARY FINCHER HALL died 14 Mar 1992 in Cairo, GA. She descends from Rucker and Frances Wayne, see Wood, p.193. Mary had been trying find out the name of her ancestor, but had not been successful. Jeannie-alogy

An exciting thing happened this summer on our vacation in Hot Springs, AR. I put together two lost families. Two brothers, who had settled in Saline County, AR, were listed there in the 1850 census with wives and children. One was Franklin ("Frank") William Rucker and the other James ("Jim") Paschal Rucker. Frank moved to Texas and Jim remained in Arkansas, where his descendants live today. The brothers kept in touch, but over the years their offspring lost touch. Descendants on both sides are members of the Rucker Family Society. In Hot Springs, AR, I contacted Irene Rucker Larsen, great granddau. of Jim.

A. D. ("Tex") Toten of Fort Worth, TX, attended the 1990 reunion, and is trying to find the father of his ancestor, Frank Rucker. He was very excited about finding his long lost cousins in Arkansas. Possibly the two families, working together, can find their mutual ancestor.

I received the following letter from Irene: "...Thank you, thank you, thank you. First for you booklet 'Hunting for Ruckers,' second for making people known to me that I never knew. No, A. D. Toten has not contacted us directly, but we have had a most delightful visit from Donna and D. M ['Skeet'] Rucker from Las Vegas, NV. They are direct descendants of Franklin Rucker." Irene goes on to say they hit it off and talked as if they had been lifelong friends.

Irene Larsen sent me a copy of a letter from Frank Rucker to Jim, proving that the two were brothers. Here is that letter. (Note: The writing is very difficult to read, so many words are guesses. No periods were used back in those days so a space has been left where one should be. Words are copied exactly as spelled.)

"June the 17 1887

"Dear Brother I seat my self to answer your kind letter which I received last week and was glad to hear from you that you was all well it found us all well but me I have bin very low for a month but I am getting better Mandy¹ is dead she died the 28 of March she down a bout 3 months & Sarah² has rented her place out and she is keeping house for me and will till fall Well Jim I am not going to make any more crops I am going to sell out all that I have got and brake up we had a storm on the 2 day of May and it blowed down my [corn] cribe and stable and it blowed down about 800 hundred pannels of fence we have got five acres in cotton is very good

"Martin³ has bin gone from home about 10 month[s] he is going to school in Hunt county Ramsey⁴ is in Mineola yet he is getting along about like he was when you heard Bet⁵ and Jening is still in Greenville the boys is getting a long very well Jim⁶ has bought him a fine jack [mule] and he give \$400 hundred dollars and he has made about \$500 hundred off of him this year I would like to come and see you this summer very much but my health is so bad that I kan not come Time is hard here and money is scarce Corn is worth 75 cents per bushel It will not be worth any thing next fall _____ (?)

"Well Jim I must [go] for this time I remain your brother un till death Yours truly F Rucker to J P Rucker"

Corrections to Sudie Rucker Wood's Book, p. 114, 130, 410 NEW EVIDENCE OF MOTHERHOOD OF THE CHILDREN OF JOHN MCDANIEL and his wives MARGARET⁴ RUCKER and LUCY⁴ (RUCKER) DAWSON by Jean B. Robinson

JOHN MCDANIEL, b. @1751, d. @1839 (Will); m. 1st @1773, MARGARET⁴ RUCKER (Ambrose³, John², Peter¹), d. @1786. After Margaret's death, John m. 2nd @1800 or 1801, LUCY⁴ RUCKER (Benjamin³, John², Peter¹), widow of Zachary Dawson. (See Wood, p.114, 129, 410.)

Wood, p. 410, gives the Will of John McDaniel, which leaves everything to six children and states four had received their inheritance "some thirty odd years ago." Because of this, both Wood and Whitley thought that the 1st six were children of his second wife and the 2nd four belonged to his first wife. Yet the marriage dates show that seven children belong to Margaret and only two or three belong to Lucy. (Will of John McDaniel dated 3 Jun 1835, prob. 18 Feb 1839, W. B. 10, p.77, Amherst Co., VA.)


