#### GEORGE FOSTER RUCKER

Track and Field Statistician Par Excellence by Michael P. Rucker


"Where in the World is Carmen Diago?" is the name of a popular geography-based board game. "Where in the World is Foster Rucker?" could be equally intriguing, because this 88 year old can often be found in the far reaches of the world.

Actually, the answer to the latter question could usually be answered by determining where the Summer Olympics or the World Track & Field Championships are in any particular year. Foster's primary lifelong interest has been attending the track field events the Olympics, or the world championships in the alternate years, not to mention a great proportion of the U. S. National meets.

Foster, who now lives in Sunriver, Oregon, developed his passion for track and field events during his days Southern Methodist University where he was a varsity athlete in the mile and half-mile. Upon his graduation in 1931, with a BS in Electrical Engineering, jobs were in short supply, so he accepted a position as an instructor in the Electrical Engineering Department. He took on a second job as Assistant Track Coach. His interest in following track events and track statistics began with this position and has never left him.

He went from there to Cal Tech where he received his MS in Electrical Engineering and accepted employment in 1934 with Leeds and Northrup, an early manufacturer of scientific and engineering measuring instruments. His career was dedicated to the development, sales and servicing of precision electrical measuring devices.

Southern California was then, as now, a great place for track, and Foster's interest grew and continues to this day. An engineer by profession, a statistician by avocation, he is listed in the directory of the Track and Field Writers of America.

According to Foster, "Track fans have a natural interest in measurement controls and statistics. They tend to think in numbers, not philosophy."

Foster married Maybelle Butterfield June 18, 1938 in Los Angeles. After living 25 years in Los Angles they moved to Philadelphia for four years where he was manager of market development. They then moved to Cleveland as district manager for the final 10 years of his career. Foster and Maybelle retired to Sunriver in December 1972. Maybelle died January 27, 1989. They have no offspring.

George Foster Rucker was born May 19, 1909 in Abilene, Texas. He is the son of Samuel James Rucker, Jr. and Frances Elizabeth Foster. His father was a Methodist Minister, serving many pastorates in the Central Texas Conference. His line of descent from his grandfather to Peter Rucker runs as follows: Samuel<sup>6</sup> James, Western<sup>5</sup> Tennessee, James<sup>4</sup>, Benjamin<sup>3</sup>, John<sup>2</sup> and Peter<sup>1</sup>.


in 1956. There, he and Maybelle met friends that have remained over forty years. Foster will renew some of these acquaintances in the year 2000 when he attends the Summer Olympics in Sydney.

Since 1956 Foster has attended seven Summer Olympics and more small track and field events than he can count. He officiated at numerous events around the country, but was "never recruited" for duty at the Olympics. A typical year will find Foster taking one (sometimes two) overseas trips and, at least, half a dozen track events in the US. He currently has plans to attend forthcoming events in Raleigh, North Carolina and Cheyenne, Wyoming in early 1998.

Foster's other interest is his massive library. If you were to read a book a day it would take you more than ten years to read all the books in Foster's library. They are arrayed on more than 250 feet of shelves in his home. Foster explains that library stemmed Maybelle's love of reading. "She never went to college," he explains. "College came to her through the Western World's great literature. She read it all." Since there are hundreds of books on track and world travel, it seems certain that Foster himself has been a major contributor to this massive book collection.

What will happen to this treasure trove? The track books will go to the Track and Field Hall of Fame in Indianapolis. Nieces and nephews will receive the titles of their choice, and the remainder will be donated to local libraries.

Shortly after retiring to Sunriver in December 1972 his statistical skills were noted and



he was asked if he would record and compile the local weather statistics. During the first eleven years of this volunteer effort the weather instruments were located in Foster's yard. Neighbors filled in for him when he and Maybelle were away. During that period he missed the twice-daily readings only two days.

He reported the readings to television radio and stations, the local newspapers, as well as, the National Weather Service. Foster notes that the electrical company used his their statistics to justify billings when people complained about their heating and electrical bills, particularly during extremes of temperature. The local golf maintenance staff used them to plan their watering In 1984 the instruschedule. ments were moved to the Sunriver Nature Center where the staff now records the measurements. Although paid staff have taken over the daily readings, Foster

still reports them to the local media and prepares the monthly reports.

Foster's physical activities includes playing tennis, swimming and doing water aerobics several days a week.

In recent years health problems have begun to slow Foster down somewhat. In 1985 he had heart bypass surgery -- five and a half bypasses, actually. Foster explains with wry smile and a twinkle in his eye that the last one must have branched into two. Early in 1997 he underwent back surgery for a pinched nerve in a lumbar disk. During his recovery he fell and injured a knee, requiring orthoscopic surgery. Still, he insists he is doing fine and will soon be back on his whirlwind schedule of attending track and field events around the world.

I'd bet on it.


### MARTHA MATILDA RUCKER COOPER

ANSWER TO QUERY: From "Jeannie-alogy," Vol. 8, No. 2 & 3, p.24: The Editor wanted to find marriage of

Elizabeth Booton and a Rucker. From a letter to Edythe Whitley at the Williamson County, Tennessee Library at Franklin, the Editor found a record of the marriage of Elizabeth ("Betsy") Booton to Ephraim<sup>5</sup> Rucker (Dewitt<sup>4</sup> Rucker, \_\_\_\_\_3, James<sup>2</sup>, Peter<sup>1</sup>). This gives evidence to Ann and Elizabeth Rucker, mentioned in the Will of their grandfather, Ephraim Rucker, as being the children of Tomagen Rucker and her first husband, Ambrose Booton.

Someone has said that the Ann Booton that married Lemuel Rucker was not the daughter of Tomagen Rucker and Ambrose Booton, but has not sent proof to substantiate it.

Note: This is from letters written by Emma L. Nock, Denver, CO, between 1926-1930 to Edythe Whitley (Vol. 1 & 8, Rucker papers, Williamson Co., TN, library at Franklin). descends from Ephraim Rucker and Betsy Booton through their daughter, Margaret Rucker who married Richard Falwell. She said the parents of Ephraim Rucker were DeWitt Rucker and Polly Sloan. She did not identify the parents of DeWitt Rucker, but he is surely of the James line. Lineage is suggested by the Editor.

The Editor thinks that, probably, Dewitt Rucker of Greenbrier Co., [W]VA, who married (27 Feb 1817) Nelly Rucker (William<sup>3</sup>, Thomas<sup>2</sup>, Peter<sup>1</sup>, Wood, p.235) may have been a son of DeWitt and Polly Sloan. What do you think?

In recent weeks both Jeannie Robinson and I found brief articles which refer to a man named Rucker as the founder of Chicago Title and Trust Company, the world's largest property title insurance company. A recent article in Illinois Heritage refers to him as Edward A. Rucker. The September/October issue of At Home in Richmond names him as Edwin A. Rucker.

Here is an excerpt from Illinois Heritage: "The year was 1847; Chicago was booming. Almost 17,000 people called it home . . . and new pioneers were streaming in steadily to grasp opportunities independence, which the rich prairie soil promised. An obscure young law clerk, Edward A. Rucker, devised a system of keeping track of every recorded instrument and legal proceeding affecting real estate titles. This saved attorneys laborious task of searching official records in connection with transfers of real property. It was a valuable service and was welcomed. Rucker hung out his shingle in the Saloon Building . . . then later that year, joined with James H. Rees in the Merchants' Exchange."

#### IN MEMORIAM - CONTINUED

ETHEL ARMINA RUCKER McDONNELL, died July 8, 1997, in Portland, Oregon, just shy of her 98th birthday. Ethel was born August 31, 1899, in Lacomb, Linn Co., Oregon, the youngest of eight children born to James Franklin Rucker and Armina Raines. Her family moved from Metz, Missouri to Oregon in 1884 and settled in Linn County. Her father was a very influential member of the community. He was, at various times, the first postmaster of Dotyville, the owner of a sawmill, and a farmer of a 280-acre farm. It was there that Ethel was born in 1899.

Her father died when she was eight years old and Ethel was left to live alone with her mother, Armina. All of her brothers and sisters had left home by that time. After her mother died in 1914, Ethel, age 15, went to work to support herself. One of her jobs was working for the Department of Justice. About this time she thought about starting a journal. She asked her boss at the Justice Department if this was a good idea, he said: "Just so long as you don't put anything personal in it that could come back to haunt you in later years." She must have taken this advise seriously, because in her later years all the journals were very impersonal accounts of her travels.

On November 18, 1927, Ethel married Lawrence William McDonnell. She and Lawrence settled in Portland, Oregon where her main hobby was playing golf. She served as President of the Oregon Women's Golf Association and, in later years, served as President of the Oregon's Women's Senior Golf Association. Ethel Lawrence were and world travelers. In their lifetime, they visited almost all the continents many times. Ethel felt that travel broadened a person.

Her home in Portland was built by her husband and father-in-law. Lawrence made the house distinctive and unique by painting the driveway a green and white check. She moved into the home as a bride and remained there until the last year of her life.

Ethel and Lawrence had no children and he preceded her in death in 1994. She continued to live in her home by herself until she was 96 years of age. She is survived by her nieces and nephews and their families who will miss her very much.

A few years ago, she turned over her genealogy work to her nephew Gerald Rucker. Gerry became very active in the Rucker Family Society, eventually becoming a board member. Before her death, Ethel made a large donation to the society to help with publication of the update of The Rucker Family Genealogy, written by Sudie Rucker Wood.


