ANCESTOR QUEST

Ed Taylor, of Amherst County, VA, and I are members of the Rucker Family Society because we share the same Great Grandmother, Mary Ann Rucker Watts (born June 15, 1811, died December 27, 1889). I became aware of the Society a few years ago and joined immediately because of my interest in the Watts genealogy.

Mary Ann Rucker and Robert White Watts were married December 24, 1835. That is well documented by their Amherst County marriage bond and a newspaper notice. There is little other information on either Robert W.(1) or Mary Ann, other than some very negative information in the Amherst County Clerk of the Circuit Court's record office.

Sudie Rucker Wood, in The Rucker Family Genealogy, on p.112-113, listed Mary Ann and Robert and their eight children. Mary Ann was the daughter of Isaac⁴ Rucker (Ambrose³, John², Peter¹) and his third wife, Mary A. Wingfield. Mary Ann's birth date was listed in the family Bible, a copy of which is at the Library of Virginia. Her death date is on her tombstone at the Shelton-Ellis-Watts Cemetery (2).

Robert W. Watts had some extended financial difficulties. He had some business reverses and there are records of his having mortgaged the land and house where he lived with his family. The mortgage included all his household possessions, his farm animals, all his farm tools, 10 bushels of corn, 1000 pounds of tobacco, and every thing of every kind and description on the plantation. Mary Ann Rucker must have had a hard life. negative documents show up in the records beginning about ten years after their marriage in 1846, 1848, 1854, etc.

I have been unable to find any record of where Robert W. Watts came from, who his parents were, his date of birth, his date of death, or where he was buried. Census records indicate he was born circa 1811 and died sometime between the 1870 and 1880 census.

The U. S. Census of 1870 shows Robert W. Watts, age 59, as the head of his household with Mary Ann, age 54, as his wife, and six children at home. The youngest was Robert W., Jr., (b. September 24, 1855, d. December 7, 1912), age 14, who was to

become my grandfather.

The 1880 U.S. Census listed Robert W., Jr., age 25, the youngest son and only male in the household, as the head of the household. Also living there was his mother, Mary Ann Rucker Watts, age 59 [sic], and his sisters: Elmira, age 39, Edna, age 37, Mary A., age 35, and Victoria, age 26. Of eight children, only three married and had issue.

Mary Ann Rucker and Robert W. Watts Sr., had another son, Joseph Bonds Watts (b. January 3, 1844, d. July 3, 1931) who was married to his cousin, Mary Jane Rucker (b. October 14, 1843, d. October 1, 1924) in 1868. They had six children, the youngest was Edna who married Robert Taylor (Ed Taylor's father).

Robert W. and Mary Ann Rucker Watts had a daughter named Rebecca (b. September 1, 1852, d. Mar 7, 1939). She was the child born before my grandfather, Robert White Watts, Jr. Rebecca married George W. Higginbotham. It was in the obituary of Rebecca Watts Higginbotham that the name of my great grandfather Robert W. Watts was written as Robert White Watts. Prior to my starting my Watts genealogical research in 1990, I was under the impression that my great-grandfather was named Robert C. Watts.

Issue (3) of Robert W. Watts and Mary Jane Rucker Watts:

- Nicholas⁶ W. Watts, b. ca 1837 (age 13 in 1850 census), d. young.
- 2. Elmira⁶ Watts, b. ca 1839 (age 11 in 1850 census); never married.
- Edna⁶ A. Watts, b. ca 1840 (age 10 in 1850 census);

unmarried.

- Joseph⁶ Bonds Watts, b. 3 Jan 1844; m. Mary⁶ Jane Rucker (Nath.⁵ W., Isaac⁴, Ambrose³, John², Peter¹, Wood, p.111).
- 5. Mary⁶ Ann Watts, b. ca 1845 (age 5 in 1850 census); unmarried.
- 6. Julia⁶ ("Victoria") Watts, b. ca 1847 (age 3 in 1850 census); unmarried.
- 7. Rebecca⁶ ("Rosa") Margaret Watts, b. 1 Sep 1852; m. 25 May 1874 (age 21), George Washington Higginbotham.
- Robert⁶ White Watts, b. 24 Sep 1855, Amherst Co., VA; m. Ida J. Burford.

Old church records indicate Mary Ann Watts attended Ivy Hill Methodist Church from 1858 to 1864. Ivy Hill is located ten miles from where the Isaac Rucker farm was located on the South Fork of the Buffalo River. Isaac Rucker, and his second wife, Mary Wingfield, were buried at Mt. Horeb Methodist Church(4) not far from his old home where he died.

Mary Ann, her husband, Robert W. Watts, and two of her brothers and their wives, sold 160 acres of land, divided on both sides of the South Fork of the Buffalo River, near Mt. Horeb Church, to Elizabeth Turpin, wife of Jeremiah Turpin, on Nov. 18, 1848. There are a large number of Turpin grave stones in the Mt. Horeb Cemetery today (5).

On May 7, 1844, Mary Ann and Robert Watts and two of Thomas brothers, and Nathan Rucker, and their wives, along with their mother, Mary Rucker, gave a triangular tract of land the Methodist to Church conference. This land is very much like the size and shape of the present Mt. Horeb Methodist Church property (6).

visited the Mt. Horeb Methodist Church and Cemetery on September 17, 1998, and inspected the land area along the South fork of the Buffalo River where the Isaac Rucker farm must have been located. My impression of the terrain is that it would be impossible to make a crop of tobacco or corn on that land today, and it must have been a very marginal farming operation back in the 1830s and 1850s. I found visiting this area a very humbling experience. The Isaac Rucker family must have been a very deprived family by 1850 standards. The area near Ivy Hill Methodist Church is just the opposite. It is beautiful land and would be very productive today. I can only assume that after Robert W. Watts Sr. lost his wife's dowry land along the South Fork of the Buffalo River and went bankrupt, he moved his family to the Ivy Hill area and continued to work as a tenant farmer on someone else's land.

I tell you all of this because I would like very much to ask your help in finding more information on Mary Ann Rucker Watts, and her husband, Robert White Watts. Is there anyone in the Rucker Family Society who would know any descendants of Mary Ann and Robert W. Watts, or the descendants of Joseph B. Watts or Rebecca Higginbotham, who might have the key to finding the answer to the riddle of the origin of Robert White Watts Sr., who married Mary Ann Rucker?

Is there anyone who might know where the Isaac Rucker home place was located?

Footnotes:

- (1) There was a second Robert W. Watts (Robert William Watts) in the Amherst County records system so it is easy to have some confusion.
- (2) The Watts family cemetery is located in Amherst Co., VA, off Route 29, west on Route 675 (Winesap Road), 3.5 miles on the left. The cemetery is 100 yards off the Winesap Road, down a colonial Period stage coach road.
- (3) Issue as listed by Doris Wade Wasden, Feb 1973 and distributed to the family.
- (4) From Wood, p.106: "Both Isaac and his wife, Mary Wingfield, were buried at Mt. Horeb Church, not far from his old home, where he died" in Amherst County.

In July 1997, Ruth McBride, Mary Johnson, and Jeannie Robinson drove to Mt. Horeb Church which is located off of Rt. 60 about ten miles west of Amherst. The cemetery seems to be an old one and has many stone markers. They could not find any marker for Isaac and Mary Rucker.

We can only rely on family legend that Isaac and his wife are buried there which may not be true at all.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

WILLIAM PARKS RUCKER (Wood, p.85) was a character in a play presented this past summer in the Greenbrier Valley (WV) Theater. Called Zona, written by New York based playwright, Jan Buttram, it about the legendary Greenbrier Ghost. This was a famous case around the turn of the last century. Zona Heaster Trout Shue in married 1896. Shortly thereafter, she died under mysterious circumstances. As her husband, Trout, publicly grieved, Zona's mother, Mary Jane Heaster, claimed that she had been visited by the ghost of her daughter, who insisted that she had been murdered by Trout. Trout was brought to trial and defended by William Parks Rucker and Jim Gardner, West Virginia's first black attorney. The exciting play, full of local history, included folk music of period. He was a member Christ Episcopal Church. first wife, Gertrude Sharbutt Rucker, died in 1961. He married Veda ("Pat") Rucker on Dec 29, 1962, who survives him. Also surviving are a son, Kendall ("Bill") Rucker Gatesville; a dau, Sara

Cunningham of Baytown; three brothers, Leonard Rucker of Fort Worth, Wilbur Rucker Charleston SC, and Ray Rucker of San Diego, CA; four sisters, Lillie Mae Rucker and Nell Winder of Fort Worth, Irene Hadley of Alamo, and Gwen Hofer of San Carlos, CA; and four grandchildren, Randall and Judith Cunningham and Phyllis and Carol Rucker. Burial was at Sunset Memorial Park.

Martin Willis Rucker Jr., b. 24 Feb 1923, in Paris, TX, d. 11 Oct 1984, age 60, was buried at the Swift Cemetery. He was the son of Martin W. Rucker Sr. and Arden Armittie Crawford Rucker. He lived most of his life in Nacogdoches and was a veteran of World War II. He was formerly employed at International Paper Plywood Plant. He was a Baptist. There were no immediate survivors.

This minister's name, as you may have guessed by now, was none other than Rueben Dawson Rucker, my ancestor. A JAMES RIVER TOBACCO BATTEAU was recently excavated in Richmond at Maymont Park. It is one of the largest ever found. More than 500 batteaux operated between Lynchburg and Richmond many years ago. An eye-witness account of the batteau man in action follows:

"If ever a man glorified in his calling...[the] batteauman was that man. His was a high calling, demanding skill, courage and strength in his degree. I can see him now striding the plank that ran along the gunwale to afford him footing, his long iron-shod pole trailing in the water behind him. Now he turns, and after one of two ineffectual efforts to get his pole fixed in the rocky bottom of the river, secures his purchase, adjusts the upper part of the pole to

the pad of his shoulder, bends to his tasks and the long, but not ungraceful bark mounts the rapids like a sea bird breasting the storm. His companion on the other side plies his pole...and between the two the boat...surmounts every obstacle be it rocks, rapids, quick sands, hammocks, etc. third...at the stern held the mighty oar that served as a rudder."
