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George H. Rucker's First Automobile By Michael "Mike" Rucker

This story dates to April 25, 1913. I found the following letter and the receipt for the new car in the Rucker Realty Corp. archives. The letter is from a car dealer to Gorge H[ilton] Rucker. The new vehicle was a 1913 Overland Touring Car. Here's the letter:

*Dear Sir:
Yours of the 24th
Received and noted. We
fully appreciate that you are
a busy man, and we only
request that you have the
same consideration for us.
Our time is just as valuable
to us as yours is to you.*

*When we sold you the car
you stated that your Mr.
Jones would be the one we
should teach to operate the
car. Our young man came
out to give him a lesson,
leaving here at nine o'clock
in the morning and reaching*

*your place in due time
thereafter, and instructed
him for just three quarters of
an hour, when Mr. Jones
took some other men in the
car and had our young man
drive them to several places
in the county, consuming all
the balance of the day up to
seven o'clock in the evening
when he arrived back here.
The next time you put your
Mr. Rees** in the car for a
lesson and the same
conditions prevailed; and
one time you took it yourself,
Mr. Jones, the man we
started out to teach, only
receiving two lessons.
Whereas had he received all
the lessons himself, he
would have been thoroughly
competent to operate the
car.*

*We are perfectly willing to
teach you, one man, how
to operate the car and take
care of same, but we cannot
furnish chauffeurs to drive
cars around on business
errands.*

*To learn thoroughly how to
operate an automobile, one

first winter stay here at our cabin on the bank of Lake Minchumina, Alaska during a raging February windstorm.

Her initial weeks included long spell of below-zero weather. Still, the 19-year-old proved game for just about anything. Right from the start she began driving the snow machine and helping with the time-consuming firewood, water, and dog yard chores.

Fiona helped haul and store tons of feed, groceries, gasoline and propane, she spent three days on the trapline splitting and stacking firewood, moved many loads of seasoned firewood from stacks in the forest to our woodshed at home, and helped cut and haul dry spruce firewood. She replaced a broken doorknob and fixed the dog-pot cooker. She shoveled snow from woodpiles, water holes, out building and the canoe we had to move for spring access.

She helped repair the snow machine with nimble fingers that it nicely between small gaps. She brushed the Icelandic horses when their massively hairy coats began shedding in the spring.

With Fiona, we celebrated the arrival of the geese and swans; we watched a pair of moose

playing, listening to wolves howling and witnessed an altercation between a swan and an eagle on the river ice. We shared intimate details about our respective recipe-storage devices (us: typed paper, stained with grease; Fiona in a cell phone, smeared with grease) and perhaps more intimately, we shared our respective chocolate stashes.

No complaints were heard regarding the "Ick Factor" – the outhouse, dog yard cleanup, animal carcasses, the sooty dog-pat, and the not-so-clean house. It's possible that a squeak was heard when she scooped a vole up in her can of dog rice, but I'm not saying if it came from the vole or the girl. Fiona even tackled the project of cleaning the skulls of a coyote and wolverine. I was gratified at her curiosity as we stood over wolf droppings a quarter mile from home. "How can you tell it's a wolf?" she inquired. "It's packed with moose hair, and our dogs haven't had any moose hide to chew on." I told her. "That means the wolves are feeding on scraps of an old kill. The poop would be tarr black if there were gorging on meat."

After a few months to adjust to our remote location, Fiona will be ready for some real isolation as breakup locks us at home for a few weeks. No more river hiking, sledding, snow machining, or visits to and fro.

With firewood and other project, and with birds arriving to brighten our days, I'm sure our companion will be fine.

Editorial note: Fur trappers and lifelong bush residents, Miki and Julie Collins, identical twins, live at remote Lake Minchumina, Alaska. They have written three books and provide a bi-weekly column called "In the Bush" to the Fairbanks *Newsminer* newspaper.

In Memoriam Judy Corinne Rucker

Judy Corinne Rucker Woolridge Susoeff, age 81, of West Sacramento, California died Sunday 27 August 2023 at a hospital in Sacramento, CA. Born in 1942 in Tulsa, OK, she was the daughter of the late Albert "Pete" Lockridge Rucker and the late Dorothy Lankford. Her sister, Connie Elizabeth Rucker Harjo Ellison died earlier in 2023. She is survived by her husband Allan Susoeff, daughter Jini and husband Mike Farrell, granddaughter Ashley Farrell, and son Lancelot Woolridge.

Judy graduated from Central High School, in Tulsa and married Garland Wooldridge in 1962. They headed west in 1972 when his employer reassigned him to northern California and Hawaii. They divorced in 1992.

An accomplished pianist and vocalist, she performed in choir, church and at weddings for many years.

Judy volunteered with the Boy Scouts of America as an assistant Den leader for 25+ years. In 1982 she became the first female to serve a term as a District Commissioner in the San Francisco Bay area Council. In 1988 she was presented with the Silver

Beaver award, the highest recognition in the BSA for distinguished volunteer service.

She was the family historian and genealogist. Judy transcribed Civil War letters in the Rucker and Keebler families published as *The Rucker and Keebler Letters in 19th century America*, Compiled by Judy Rucker Susoeff, Sacramento, VA, 2013. One story was about the burning of the family home by the Union Army. Another about a Rucker that gave his slaves Sundays off where they typically went into town hired out and kept their earnings. He writes that farm productivity significantly increased since he started that day off. Bound copies of the transcriptions are in the Tennessee State Library and Archives and the Center for American History at the University of Texas at Austin.

Judy learned carpentry and woodworking from her father. She liked to travel to English speaking countries like Australia, New Zealand and England. She enjoyed bowling and playing ping-pong.

Lucy Tinsley Rucker's tombstone

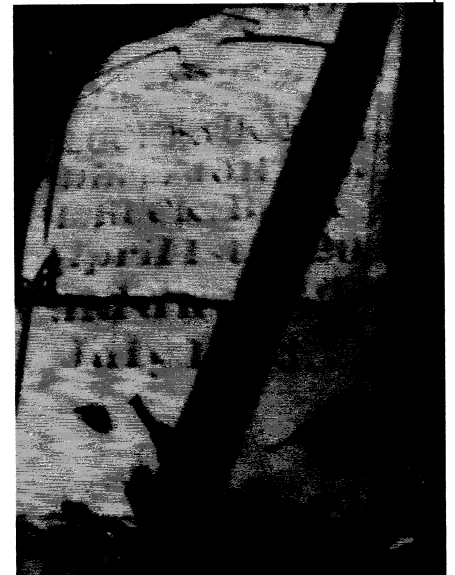

Lucy Tinsley Rucker wife of John D. L. Rucker born Apr 1, 1820 and died July 10, 1853.

It is the only marked stone in that cemetery, Doug recalls.

Jeannie's records showed Lucy was buried in a Tinsley family cemetery, located south of Elon, near the James River in Amherst Co., VA.

It sounds like the same place, but I have not seen it so appreciate Doug sending me the photo of the tombstone.

Doug MacLeod, a Lynchburg area historian, spoke to us at our reunion in Amherst Co., VA in June of 2020. Since then he has sent me interesting tidbits found in the Lynchburg newspaper. Here is one of them. 4 Jan 1878, Ad from the Lynchburg *Daily Virginian*.

It was a difficult search, but Ancestry records led me to

find him in Wood, p.90. His full name was listed as George⁵ Henry McDaniel Rucker (Ambrose⁵, Reuben⁴, Ambrose³, John², Peter¹). However I found his full name was George McDaniel Rucker - there was no evidence of the name Henry.

George had 12 children whom I continued to search. George M.'s son, Banks Rucker, was born in Lynchburg, VA, moved to Rye, Westchester Co., NY, and then to Los Angeles, CA. Banks had a son George McDaniel [sic] Rucker who lived in Los Angeles, but had two sons

I can find no evidence in any records that he had the middle name "Henry."

born in Amherst Co., VA. HEY, that's not logical. So I kept looking and found another George M. Rucker who lived in Amherst Co., VA.

Two George McDaniel Ruckers Confused in records on Ancestry.com

Both George M. Ruckers were born about the same time, but one lived in Amherst Co., VA, and the other lived in Los Angeles, CA. How could people mistake them in records? It turns out that only one was named George McDaniel Rucker and he came by it naturally as his great-grandmother was Margaret McDaniel, the daughter of George McDaniel. The other had the middle name "Mack" not McDaniel.

Peaks View Farm Monroe, Amherst County Virginia By Gloria Stiltner



Peaks View Farm off Father Judge Road is a story of "a fortunate stroke of serendipity." After selling their 130-acre farm in Historic Waterford, VA, Roy and Gloria Stiltner found a 207-acre farm and house that needed renovation in Monroe, Amherst Co., VA in 2004 and purchased it from Sam Morcum. It took two years to renovate the house doing it part-time. They moved to the farm in 2012. It is probably one of the most beautiful farms and views of High Peak Mountain in Amherst County.

The lineage of ownership of the land – the original patent of 5850 acres was taken up by John Rucker and completed in 1745 from King George II to

Peter³ Rucker (son of John² Rucker, Peter¹). This land was divided up among the sons of John Rucker.

11 Nov 1751, Peter Rucker, oldest son and heir of Jno. Rucker, dec'd, of Orange Co., planter, to Ambrose Rucker of Orange, planter; by order of father's will—taken up by Jno. & patented to Peter Rucker, 324 acres, save four acres for David Rosser, adj. Harvie Rosser. Wit: Jno. Rucker, Wm. Miller, Geo. McDaniel. (D. B. 1, p.357, Albemarle Co., VA).

1810 (473 acres) was purchased by John Hansard (by highest bid) husband of Ambrose³ Rucker's daughter, Caroline⁴ Rucker.

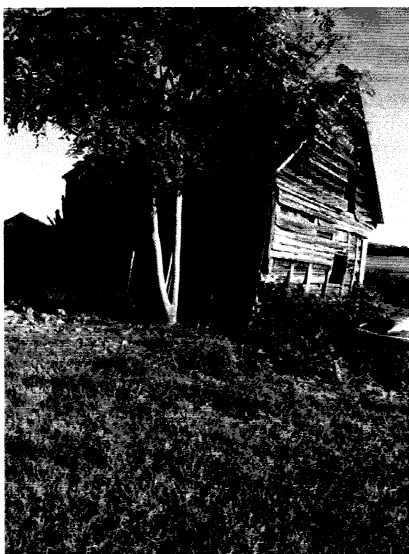
1935 to 1958

Ed Miller bought the property in 1935 for his wife as a wedding present. He operated a dairy farm, and stored wheat and corn in the grain log cabin building. Laura Carter Miller planted the Catalpa tree and 6 boxwoods in 1935. They are huge and still gracing the property. There was a log cabin house with stone chimney. A black family, Joe and Mattie Carter and daughter Vonnice and Granddaughter Thelma lived in this house and helped the Millers on the farm. The Millers had two children Nancy (b. 1937) and Jean (1940-1973). They sold the property and moved on, in 1958 because of a 5-year drought in Amherst County, VA. Gloria still phones Nancy Miller Irving, 86 years old, who lives in Louisville, KY. Last year when the Stiltners were digging an irrigation trench they unearthed a trash burial ground of bottles and jars dumped there from 1935 to 1958. Gloria found a prescription bottle with Nancy's name on it as a young child. She called Nancy and Nancy said "Am I in trouble?" Nancy remembers quite well taking these items to this garbage pit. A wonderful find for a treasure hunter.

The Stiltners have been visited by Pat Gregory Tucker and Robert Gregory. Their mother, Hazel Dodd, the granddaughter of George W. Dodd, was born in the house in 1915. Their paternal grandfather, Leslie Clark Gregory, helped build the stonewall at the entrance to the Amherst Cemetery. Leslie Gregory was a building contractor and served as

Superintendent of the cemetery for several years.

In 2023 The Stiltners had a surprise drive in visit by George E. Dodd (age 94), and his wife and two daughters. He was the son of Henry Homer Dodd, the son of George W. Dodd. George E. Dodd was born in 1929 in the log cabin on the farm. This cabin still existed in 2004 in a dilapidated condition. It was sold to Buzzards Roost, a Lynchburg Antiques Dealer, and reassembled on a property owned by them. The stone chimney stood until 2020 when it collapsed on its own. George left Amherst, VA as a teenager to join the Navy and now lives in Virginia Beach, VA.

In November 2023, The Stiltners arranged to have a get together with the Gregorys

and the Dodds. It was a fabulous visit. Pat and Robert had not seen their cousin George for 30 years. George's daughter, Susie Dodd says she would love to have the farm back in her family one day. When the visitors depart, Gloria gives them a connection to the house, either a door trim rosette block or a glass doorknob. The experiences were all serendipity. We call it one of Godwinks.

Gloria Stiltner Biography:

The Stiltners have always been a fan of history and lived in historical homes. Their first renovation in 1972 was one of the Greenbelt MD WWII Defense homes. They also renovated an 1856 house on 2 acres in Vienna, VA and then they built an all-stone historic looking house on 135 acres in Waterford VA. They now live in the house described in this article on 207 acres in Monroe, VA. Gloria retired from the US Geological Survey in 2000. She currently is a Realtor with BHHS-DFG. She is a member of the Amherst Historical Museum, the Amherst Women's Club, the Lynchburg Historical Society, and the Rucker Family Society and likes to play golf.

Whereon he now resides, in Amherst county, distant 12 miles from Lynchburg and 10 from Amherst court house, known by the name as **GRAHAM'S COVE**, containing 1350 acres between 4 and 500 of which are cleared. This land lies well and is in good heart. The dwelling house is comfortable and convenient, and has attached to it the necessary out houses, orchards, &c. There is yet a large portion of good Tobacco land to clear, which is very heavily timbered. The whole tract is well watered.

Also, One other Tract,

Adjoining the above described land, containing upwards of 700 acres. On this tract there are two settlements, on one of which is a very good house, all finished, outhouses, orchards, a good garden, &c. and of the other a comfortable dwelling house, orchards, &c. This tract also adjoins the lands of John Sheldon, Col. John Ambler and others.

Also, One other Tract,

Adjoining the first described tract as the south-west side, containing 839 acres, chiefly in woods, not more then 70 acres being cleared, which were well enclosed. This tract is well timbered, and is fine Tobacco land.

Graham's Cove Sale of Col. Ambrose Rucker land in Amherst County, VA

The enclosed article was from an Ad from the Lynchburg *Daily Virginian* sent to me by Doug MacLeod of Lynchburg. What a wonderful ad as it confirms the name of Col. Ambrose Rucker's land. The Ambrose Rucker that wrote the ad was Col. Ambrose's son who had already moved to Bedford Co., VA.

The following was written by Gloria Stiltner in her article, Peaks View Farm:

Col. Ambrose Rucker patented land on the south branches of Harris Creek in Graham Cove where he then moved. 90 acres, 10 Sep 1767, Patent Book 37, 1767-1768, p.116. 262 acres, 20 July 1768, Patent Book 37, 1767-1768, p.320. 375 acres, 20 July 1780, Patent Book E, 1775-1776, 1780-1781, p.272

This land also contains the walled graveyard, which still belongs to his descendants, but there are no markers for Col. Ambrose and his wife, Mary.

Now we know that Ambrose Rucker's farm was called **Graham's Cove**. I had always called it Graham Cove as that what it was called in the patent.

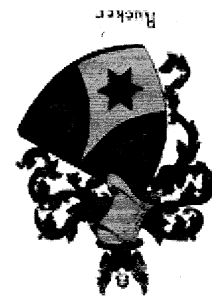
